Davis Creek, Anodoc Co. Born in Cumberland Co. Kentucky.

March 10. 1834. When 5 years old, father moved to Platte Co., Ano. Another died two months after arining, leaving a family of eight children. Jaught a year and six months and as I had lived in the north, notwithstanding all my mothers people were slaveholders, I was comfelled to leave. I communed my Botanical (studies) in Cala. in 1866 but did little at it till 1872. We lived in the mines on Black Hawk Creek. Early in this year, hof. Lem mon came to our home peddling Books, and when he saw a small cabinet which I had made out of a soap box in which I had some insect, mineral and plant specimens, he took off his hat and waving it over his head, gave three cheers for the woman who was cook. ing for miners and trying to slidy nature under such adverse circum stances. I thought he was off his ba lance as he was a physical wreck, not having been long out of the Com

federate prison at andersonielle. He starts ed on his Botanical career here. He visit ed us every summer for several years on his collecting birps, and he and here. Pulsifer ames helped me greatly in my Hoave collected in Humas, Butto, Sasser, Jehrma and Gradoc Counties Collected two summers in the cascades of Oregon for the Smithsonian and Shaw Gotan ical Gardens, St. Louis, Mo. I made my first collection of plants in Illinois, about 50 species, and about the same number in Jenn. We left Konsas Christmas Day, 1864. going by rail to how york where we took the Harth Star steamer for Panama crossing the isthmus on the cars. Here we took the Golden age or Golden Gate (I don't remember which) for San transes arining there early in Feb. 1865. We went from here to the mines in Plumas Co., where we spent ten years.

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(Darlingtonia Kotes) 1. I found the honey secretion inside the boods, on the fishtails and extend ing down the wing of the petioles to the ground. It was most abundant in. September. 2. Found that by feeding the new baves fresh beef, mutton, eggs or break that the digestive liquid in the tubes was greatly increased - sometimes fill ing the tube and flowing out of the orifice of hood; that salt and cheese destroyed the leaf, forming a crust on the outside broads of a bittertaste.

3. Found a small white laws in the tubes of most of the leaves - was abundant in new leaves before the orifice of the hoods were open or any insects had been captured. Sometimes they were wound up together in balls the size of a small pea. They were always present winter and summer.

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KEDDIE, CAL., I send to you one old ledger and day book. Other notices of my work were published in several america Journals of Botany, Eaton's Ferns of Houth a. american haturalist, Botanical Gazettes and Geological (Survey) of Cal. Botony. I collected many seeds for Botanical Gardens. Exchanged Herbarium spicimens.

From a MSS record of Mrs. Austin's experiments with Drosera:

"In a few seconds after having placed the meat on the leaves, and more particularly when placed on the hairs on their margins, I noted a slight quivering motion, as if they were shaken gently by the wind. This motion was repeated at intervals of a few seconds, till the leaf was folded about the meat, when it would cease."
